

Training of Trainers on Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) for NGOs

From 29th to 31st of December, 2011

At Himachal Pradesh Institute of Public Administration (HIPA)

The National DM Act 2005 brought many a great changes in our approach to Disaster Management. Since the enactment of the DM Act, there has been a paradigm shift from a relief-centric approach to a multi-faceted endeavour involving diverse scientific, engineering, financial and social process to adopt a multi-disciplinary and multi-sectoral method. In this context, the role of NGOs in disaster risk reduction becomes very crucial. Considering the urgent need and significance of building the capacities of NGOs over Community-based Disaster Preparedness and Response, the Himachal Pradesh State Disaster Management Authority (HPSDMA) organized a 3-day Training of Trainers on Disaster Risk Reduction for the leaders and members of different NGOs working in the state. The ToT aimed at training the NGOs to help the community in the development of a contingency plan at their level and enable them to learn to manage disasters and to cope with them effectively. This ToT was organized jointly by the DM Cell of the Himachal Pradesh Institute of Public Administration (HIPA) from 29th to 31st of December, 2011 and a total of 40 participants from 27 NGOs working in 12 districts of the state participated in it.

The proceedings of the 3-day long ToT on DRR are given below:

Day-1: 29th of December, 2011

- ***What is Disaster Risk Management?***

Dr. R. K. Sood, Professor and Head, DM Cell, HIPA gave an comprehensive overview of the concept of Disaster Risk Management. Dr. Sood explained the key elements of Disaster Risk Reduction including Hazards, Risk and Vulnerability and classified the types of these elements. Dr. Sood interacted with the participants and tried to get a hint of their existing level of understanding over the concept of DRR. He also presented an overview of the hazard and vulnerability profile of Himachal Pradesh and elucidated the district-specific hazards and vulnerabilities duly illustrated with maps and graphics.

- ***Institutional Framework of DM in India and Himachal Pradesh***

State Project Officer- HP, Shri D.C. Rana delivered a presentation on the post DM Act 2005 institutional framework at the country as well as state level. Shri Rana told the participants that there has been a paradigm shift in the DM framework and

institutional mechanism in the country. He briefed the participants over the constitution of NDMA, SDMA and DDMA and explained the respective functions of these bodies. Shri Rana told the participants that the HP State Disaster Management Authority (HPSDMA) is chaired by the hon'ble Chief Minister of the state while the State Executive Committee (SEC) is headed by worthy Chief Secretary, Govt. of HP. He added that NGOs can contribute to the DRR related process at district level and coordinate with the District Disaster Management Authorities that are chaired by the Deputy Commissioners of respective districts. Shri Rana also reflected on the achievements of the HPSDMA, with special focus on the implementation of the Gol-UNDP DRR Programme (2009-2012) which has been instrumental in the progress of the DRR related interventions in the state.

- ***Mainstreaming DRR with Development***

The Resource person for this very crucial session was Shri Anup Karanth of TARU Leading Edge Pvt. Ltd., one of India's most influential consulting firms trans-disciplinary subjects related to Development. In the beginning of his presentation, Shri Karanth introduced the participants with the objectives of mainstreaming. He told that mainstreaming DRR is referred to as the integration of disaster risk reduction measures into development planning, poverty reduction strategy, as well as resource management and environmental protection. During his presentation, Shri Karanth informed the participants about the following topics:

- 1) Relationship between Development and Disaster
- 2) Disaster, a matter of development
- 3) Rapidly emerging economies: to build for avoiding the next big catastrophe
- 4) Human and Nature interaction
- 5) Mainstreaming Vulnerability and Climate Change into Sustainable Development Planning
- 6) Mainstreaming DRR into development projects in hazard prone countries
- 7) Mainstreaming DRR concerns into Poverty Reduction Strategies

To give a realistic sense of mainstreaming DRR into development planning, Shri Anup Karanth presented two Case Studies from Gujarat including:

- a) Surat City Resilience Strategy (Flood risk, Sea-Level Rise)
- b) Post-earthquake Rehabilitation & Reconstruction, Presentation by Gujarat Urban Development Company Ltd.

- ***Role of NGOs in DM***

Shri D C Rana facilitated this session which was more interactive and participants were asked to suggest various roles they can play at the time of disasters. Participants suggested a number of areas where they can contribute to the DRR process in the state:

- a) Community mobilization and awareness generation
- b) Capacity Building and Training of Volunteers on DRR
- c) Assessment of hazards, risks and vulnerabilities at local-level
- d) Effective coordination of the relief operations
- e) Sharing and mobilization of resources for DRR in the state
- f) Strengthening the endeavours of the HPSDMA in different ways

- ***Who are the stakeholders in DRM***

Shri D C Rana briefed the participants about the various stakeholders involved in the process of Disaster Risk Reduction at state-level. Shri Rana emphasized on adopting an inclusive approach towards DRM and said that it is the responsibility of every individual and organization to contribute to the DRM related processes. He added that Media, Academic Institutions, Research Institutes, Corporate Houses, Small and Medium Scale Business Groups, Government departments, NGOs, CBOs and Volunteers, all share the responsibility of strengthening the DRM related endeavour in the state.

- ***Role of Community / NGOs in HVRA***

In order to clear ground for the involvement of community and NGOs in the proposed HVRA study, Shri Anup Karanth delivered a presentation of the role of community. Shri Karanth told the participants that HVRA is undertaken as a Four Part Assessment:

- Hazard Risk Analysis
- Assessment of elements at risk
 - a) Physical elements: housing, critical buildings and lifelines
 - b) Socio-economic elements: various categories of population/SECs, economically and socially vulnerable
 - c) Economic elements: productivity activities, especially agriculture, industry and trade
- Vulnerability Assessment
- Composite Risk Assessment: Mathematical and geographical analysis of Composite Risk on a GIS Platform and its representation in the form of ATLAS

Shri Karanth explained the key component of the HVRA analysis so that the NGOs can participate effectively in the study. He elaborated the following points:

- Capturing Dimensions of Vulnerability
- Sustainable Livelihoods Framework
- Vulnerability assessment – Key Steps
- Identification of indicators of vulnerability
 - a) Past events and impacts (eg. damage to building stocks, loss of life)
 - b) Status of elements at risk (eg. building composition, age structure)
 - c) Assessing potential damage for various intensities of hazard events
 - d) Capital and gross value added for various elements at risk
 - e) Development of vulnerability curves

To broaden the understanding of the participants, Shri Anup Karanth cited two Case Studies on (1) End-to-End Early Warning Framework and (2) Strategic Risk Profile for Investments.

Day-2: 30th of December, 2011

- ***Preparation of Community Based DM Plans***

Shri Parag Talankar from SEEDS India introduced the participants about the key components of a Community Based Disaster Management Plan. Shri Talankar divided his presentation into following 6 parts which covered the fundamental information about the preparation of a CBDM Plan:

- Development Priorities

- Demographic Details
- Socio Economic Details

- ***What is Mock Drill + Simulation Exercise on Mock Drill***

Shri Jog Singh Bhatia, Master Instructor from the National Institute of Training in SAR and Disaster Response was the key Resource Person for this very informative and practical session on mock drill on Search & Rescue and basic First Aid. During this session, Shri Jog Bhatia and his colleague Shri Raj Kumar demonstrated practical methods of performing the following Search and Rescue and First Aid activities:

- 1) Potential injuries during disasters
- 2) Reaching to and Communicating with the Victim
- 3) Performing Triage
- 4) Approaching to a victim
- 5) Personal protective equipments for medical responders
- 6) Checking Vital Signs: Respiration, Pulse, Skin, Pupils and Blood pressure
- 7) Checking ABC (Airway, Breathing and Circulation)
- 8) Checking any life threatening Injuries (Critical bleeding)
- 9) Performing Physical examination using D.O.T.S. method (Deformity, Open Injury, Tenderness, and Swelling)

10) Providing specific pre-hospital treatment

- Control Bleeding
- Splinting including spinal protection
- Treat for shock
- Stabilising the victim
- Extricating the victim
- Evacuate to nearest hospital

11) Moving Victims

12) Necessary equipment for rescue

13) Basic First Aid kit

- ***Gender Mainstreaming in the DRR Planning Process***

Renowned expert on Gender issues, Dr. Aparna Negi, Professor, Himachal Pradesh University delivered a presentation on Gender Mainstreaming in the DRR Planning Process. In her presentation, Dr. Negi talked about the Roles & responsibilities of Women in DRR, Demographic changes, Economic impacts, Psychological impacts, Security issues, Cultural aspects, Nutrition issues, and following relevant topics.

- Specific Needs of Women and Girls
- Access to information & knowledge in vulnerability reduction
- Involvement in decision making – bodies & process
- Equal participation & involvement for better preparedness
- Gender segregated data
- Capacity building of women's groups & CBOs
- Reorienting attitudes
- Monitoring programme implementation & evaluation
- Need assessment of community
- Awareness generation in community
- Participation in vulnerability reduction initiatives
- Capacity building through interactive methodologies
- Capacity building of community leaders
- Damage assessment through gender sensitive formats
- Relief to be planned keeping in view gender equity
- Include women's voices in decision making through consultations
- Joint ownership of property
- Income generating activities for men & women be planned

- Safeguard women against violence, exploitation etc
- Crèche facilities be provisioned
- Provisions for pregnant & lactating women
- Transportation to redressed women's mobility
- Compensation money can be disbursed to women

Day-3: 31st of December, 2011

- ***Need and Damage Assessment***

Shri D. C. Rana and Shri Parag Talankar jointly facilitated this session on Need and Damage Assessment. Shri Rana mentioned that the Need and Damage Assessment is a comprehensive process and contains a thorough analysis of the post-disaster situation on various parameters, some of which are generally overlooked or forgotten.

- ***Group Work and Presentation-***

In the end of the training, participants were divided into 5 groups to identify problems and solutions in post disaster scenario in the following areas:

- *Education*
- *Health*
- *Livelihood*
- *Shelter*

After the group work, the findings of the group work were shared with all participants.
